## Clare's Colloquy

**Rev. Clare Petersberger**

We celebrated the life of Dr. Jack Childers at 10 AM on May 21. Dr. Jack put in writing his wishes: “It is my desire that, in the event my survivors and friends wish to mark my passing, there be held a *joyful* memorial service at the Towson Unitarian Universalist Church...with the express intent of celebrating the length and contentment of my years rather than lamenting my absence.” Dr. Jack found contentment in pondering “big questions.” Almost a decade ago, he delivered a sermon at TUUC in which he said,



“As I have grown older, like most people I have begun to contemplate the probability that I will not, contrary to my youthful assumptions, live forever. This has raised some questions in my mind which I would like to share with you. The first is, ‘Why do we die?’

This is not a trivial question. Consider the lowly amoeba. In a real genetic sense, the amoeba is immortal. Each of the cells which result from an amoeba's division is not just like the original cell, in

the way our children may be like us, with mother's eyes, father's chin, and so on. Each of those two resulting amoebas IS the original amoeba, both genetically and physically.....

Certainly, as far as anyone knows, the amoeba is unaware of its existence, and thus also unaware of its immortality. We, on the other hand, are blessed (or cursed) with the knowledge of the certainty of our demise. We are probably alone, at least on this planet, in our awareness of our being as part of a larger creation."

Whether from the chair in his home; or from TUUC's pulpit; or from his role as TUUC's Board President in 2000-2001, Dr. Jack pondered our being as part of a larger creation. There was much to celebrate on May 21.

And as we move into the rhythm of summer, may we, too, cultivate awareness of our being as part of a larger creation. In so doing, may we, like Dr. Jack, find contentment and joy.

## Board and O-Team

The Board and Operations team are focusing on several important upcoming events. Primarily, we are busy formulating the budget for the Congregational Meeting, to be held on Sunday, June 12 (pot luck starts at 5 PM, meeting at 6 PM). The office staff will mail the proposed budget and the slate of nominations on May 24, so all members and friends will have a chance to review these documents prior to the meeting. NOW is the time to make budget suggestions to me or other members of the board if you wish them to be considered on June 12.

**Please note** the following bylaws change (in underlined italics) that was voted on and approved at the January Congregational meeting:

In the TUUC bylaws, on page 4, Article Four, Section Two, Part C: Written notice of all meetings shall be provided to the membership. *Written notice must be provided of any proposed increase in overall budget expenses of more than \$1,000.* Those notices shall be mailed and distributed at least two weeks prior to any meeting.

The nominations committee was successful in filling all but one open position; unfortunately, we do NOT have a candidate for President-Elect. If you have suggestions for this position, please contact one of the board members. The Board will also plan to take nominations from the floor, with the prior consent of the person being nominated and prior notification of the board.

The second event the leadership is planning is the start of our lease with the Auburn School beginning on June 1<sup>st</sup>. Over the summer, the school will be holding a camp; their official school opening will be on Tuesday, September 6<sup>th</sup>. A great deal of work is required to bring our facility into compliance with county, state and federal requirements for the school's occupancy. Final architectural plans will be completed in the next few weeks for submission to the county for their approval and issuance of relevant construction permits. Construction is scheduled to begin over the summer.

I want to inform you of several updates on the work of the Healthy Congregations workgroup. First, they successfully scheduled and led two "Congregational Conversations" on April 17 and May 15. Board members discussed the budget and the strategic plan to groups of about 25 people at each. The feedback we received from the attendees was very constructive and informative. Second, the workgroup will continue its efforts to improve communication between TUUC's lay leadership and the congregation with additional meetings next Fall. A summary of past meetings will appear in the next Threshold for those who were unable to attend.

### Update on YRE Classes Next Fall

We thank everyone who has filled out registration forms for next year and has filled out the teaching positions they are interested in for next year. **Please return these forms by June 5 or before!** Please be in touch if you have questions about how your family can be part of the YRE ministry by joining a teaching team. The theme for next year is our fifth source, which is “Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God’s love by loving our neighbors as ourselves.”

Some people question why we as UUs teach the Bible. As Kaye McSpadden (Religious Education chair at UU Fellowship of Lafayette, IN) tells us, “Biblical heritage is an integral part of western culture and history. Biblical references are common in art, music, language, architecture, literature, and many other aspects of our culture. Our children and youth must be knowledgeable about the Bible just to be well-rounded, culturally literate members of our society. We do them a disservice by neglecting this part of their religious education.” Of course, the Bible is also part of their Unitarian Universalist religious heritage. We are looking forward to using two new and highly acclaimed curricula next year in order to make sure our children learn this heritage: Picturebook Bible for K/1<sup>st</sup> grade and Bibleodeon for the 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> grade class will supplement Timeless Themes, for 2<sup>nd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> graders that we have used before. To make these stories as relevant as possible for the whole community, Rev. Clare, Joe Gascho, and I will coordinate to tie these stories into the opening of worship when possible.

## Joyce Duncan, Credentialed Religious Educator

If you attended church on Sunday, May 15, you heard Reverend Clare tell the story of how Joyce Duncan is now a Credentialed Religious Educator. The Religious Education Credentialing Program is sponsored by the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations and it works to strengthen Unitarian Universalist religious education through the continued development and professionalization of lay religious educators, and to provide a clear and effective system for standards and recognition of these achievements.

This program requires a large commitment of time and energy, spanning two to three years! Joyce applied to the program, was accepted and assigned a mentor, with whom she communicated monthly. She attended training workshops for liberal

religious educators, and read many books. Joyce had to demonstrate competency in twelve areas, including our Christian and Jewish Heritage, Anti-Oppression/Anti-Racism/Multiculturalism, Human & Faith Development, UU History & Polity, Administration, and Youth and/or Young Adult. For each of the competency areas, Joyce read books, attended Renaissance training modules, and brought her influence, ideas and creativity to TUUC’s Youth Religious Exploration program. The written package that Joyce submitted included a personal faith statement, work products for each competency, a list of all the books she read and all the training workshops she attended. In all, her package was over 123 pages!

How do I know this? I read it! Having been on the YRE committee for most of Joyce’s tenure as our Director of Religious Exploration, and as an experienced RE teacher, I was pleased to write one of the three recommendations that were also needed. I was expected to comment on each of the twelve competencies and respond to other questions; in total my recommendation was eight pages long.

Joyce traveled to Boston for the final step in the credentialing process—to lead a worship element and then make a presentation to the credentialing committee.

When you see Joyce, please congratulate her!

Ah, June when we celebrate both Gay Pride Month and Candy Month—Pride and chocolate, or even better caramels, all at once. Of course, it is also National Accordion Awareness Month—the less said the better.

In the spirit of *those who don't know history are doomed to repeat it* let me quote the opening paragraph from Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia:

The **Stonewall riots** were a series of spontaneous, violent demonstrations against a police raid that took place in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969, at the Stonewall Inn, in the Greenwich Village neighborhood of New York City. They are frequently cited as the first instance in American history when people in the homosexual community fought back against **a government-sponsored system that persecuted sexual minorities**, [my emphasis] and they have become the defining event that marked the start of the gay rights movement in the United States and around the world.

Let me repeat the date: June 28, 1969. That is when the modern gay rights movement began. The Unitarian Universalist Association's Welcoming Congregation program began twenty—yes, twenty—years later with a vote at the General Assembly in 1989. This year in 2011 the legislature of Maryland tabled marriage rights rather than vote on it. They hope, that rather than do what they were elected to do—vote on legislation, a referendum will occur. My friend Ranice says, "Do I get vote on *your* marriage now?"

I was twenty in 1969. Richard Nixon became president, women couldn't serve on juries in many states, homosexuality was illegal, Neil Armstrong walked on the moon, the National Association for the Repeal of Abortion Laws (NARAL) was formed, Edward Kennedy drove off the Chappaquiddick Bridge, Bethel New York was overrun by the Woodstock Festival, 250,000 people marched in Washington DC protesting the Vietnam war and the Supreme Court decided that "all deliberate speed" was not constitutionally acceptable and ordered the immediate desegregation of 33 Mississippi school districts.

June 28, 1969. Forty-two years ago. Uganda, with the encouragement of some American, will probably declare homosexuality a capital offense before this article appears.

June 28, 1969. Forty-two years ago. Amazing changes in the world. Our robots crawl on the surface of Mars and rush out of the solar system. I've been called to jury duty at the end of May. An African-American family, despite the cries of the residual racists, lives in the White House. Three women have been Secretary of State. Women, for good or ill, serve in war zones, and engage in combat (whatever the rules and regulations say). Men and women who are "out" are elected to all levels of government. Gays and lesbians can designate one another as health care proxies.

And yet, and yet...Friends of mine traveling in their RV from Michigan to Florida felt obliged to tell the hospital staff they were sisters when one fell ill. They didn't have the energy to fight and the hospital was relieved to accept their word. I sometimes get called 'sir' in stores; still get called names in the street and worry the words will turn into physical assault.

June 28, 1969. Forty-two years ago. All deliberate speed? It is a quiz: yes or no.

But June is lovely and green. So let us celebrate the victories, the distances traveled.

Hope for the best of June weather for the Baltimore Pride Festival. Eat a chocolate or a caramel—don't forget it is also Candy Month; stop by TUUC's booth and thank the volunteers; or even volunteer yourself.

## Wise Gardening & Pest Management

### *Louise Harmony*



Two people came to the May 21<sup>st</sup> regularly scheduled work party, which was scheduled simultaneously with a very large Memorial Service at the church (not on purpose = just worked out that way). All power equipment was quiet by 9:30 AM. The new sign-in procedure for Work Party participation was skipped, because there was too much work to do. Thanks so much to Betty Lou Anderson and Kim Peabody.

A great deal was accomplished during the Work Party and because I put in a lot of extra hours.

**Garden behind the handicap parking spaces:** Weeds and vines pulled out, Round Up on wood weeds so they would not "infect" the bed, plants planted, fertilized and lightly mulched. Planted 3 baby trees 4 inches high (one Juniperus Virginiana, and two hollies) at the top of the hill. They have 3 inch high plastic bottomless rims around them, so no one will step on them. IF we need them, they will be ready for transplant in 3 years. Otherwise they can stay where they are.

**Bed inside the circle with the big tree (next to the front entrance).** Over half the plants were dug out and trashed, because this bed was so infested with weeds that it would have been an extremely time consuming job to separate the weeds from the plants. The remaining plants were transplanted to the handicap bed and the bed near the sidewalk. Leaves from the "good mulch pile" (the pile near the stream that has NO OTHER PLANTS IN IT) was used to raise the level of the ground a little. These leaves will deteriorate slowly allowing the root system of the tree to slowly adjust to the

new soil and send roots up to get fed. Landscape cloth was laid and mulch was applied over the landscape cloth. The plans for this bed: Keep it as it is or, when time permits, change it to a "Buddhist Meditation Garden" complete with a small rake. There is not enough person power to keep this bed weeded properly.

**Bed to the left of the sidewalk entrance to the downstairs.** This area is a problem, because soil from the hill washes onto the sidewalk creating a slippery condition, which could cause a fall. This entrance is used each Sunday as a way for the children and parents for the religious education program to access the church. The erosion control plan that I tried is this: mulch the top part of the driveway in attempt to divert the water to run down the OUTSIDE of the liriopie that borders the driveway to the sidewalk (thereby avoiding the movement of the soil in the bed), plant more liriopie, Vinca minor, and some pachysandra toward the sidewalk area, mulch lightly, pull out the day lilies next to the sidewalk (they grow tall because of lack of sunlight and impede pedestrian passage), mulch the area on either side of the sidewalk, fertilize all plants to encourage quick new growth. I will get with Joyce Duncan, Director of Religious Education, and Dawn Murr, head of Grounds Attractiveness, to see if a green indoor/outdoor carpet can be purchased and placed near the drain until the plants fully develop. **Bed to the right of the sidewalk entrance to the downstairs entrance:** put in a short path to connect the sidewalk to the back yard.

**Pathway to the Left of the Aucubas around the garbage can shed:** pruned Aucuba from the bottom only. Put in a wide pathway so the lawn mowers can gain access to the picnic area. I believe the mulch I used will not be sufficient. If anyone sees that the mulch has slid after a rain OR after the lawn mower machines go over it, contact Louise. For quicker response use the phone I have another idea for this area, but it involves buying material, so I wanted to try the "free" way first.

**Pachysandra hillside:** hand weeded the right side as you face the picnic area and started on the left. Planted "place holder" plants at the top of the hill. Pachysandra like shade and only tolerate sun. The leaning tree at the edge of the pachysandra bed is due to come out sometime this summer. When this happens, there is a good possibility that the whole bed might die slowly, I hope. These "place holder plants" are there to hold the soil in place while decision about what to do with this area are being made.

**TUUC sign bed and the entrance to the nature walkway:** sprayed this area with Round Up to control weeds. Mother nature is going to water all the new transplants.
