## YOUTH RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

All the younger groups will start upstairs as usual for the beginning of the service and will be sung out to classes, led by Patricia Lott, who is subbing for the DRE this Sunday.

### **PreK/K Chalice Children Chalice Making**

This session will help preschoolers understand the shape of the chalice, experience the Chalice Children group as safe and caring, feel a growing sense of belonging in the group, and feel a sense of identity with a Unitarian Universalist congregation. They will read *A Cup of Light* and make their own chalice from play dough.

### **1st/2nd Wonderful Welcome Gift of Kindness**

This session introduces kindness as an intangible gift that can be freely given every day. The Wonder Box holds a golden ruler that represents one of Jesus' timeless teachings: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." The Golden Rule can be found in many faith traditions. In the story, "The Very Short Rule," the children hear a parable in which Jesus teaches that

following all the rules in the Bible will not necessarily make someone a good person. If we are to follow only one rule, Jesus taught, we should be kind to others in the same way that we would want others to be kind to us.

### **3rd-5th Cultural Tour of World Religions**

Children will learn more about the earth-centered religions as seen in the Inuit people. This class will spend some time outdoors making and learning about fire as part of this tradition.

### **6th-8th Harry and UU Session 4 Double Potions**

Making potions of various ingredients leads to discussions of how individuals can form a community greater than the sum of its parts. They continue planning for a book drive to fight the horcrux of illiteracy.

**8th-12th YRUU** Last Sunday, the group discussed a variety of topics centered around the idea of ethical decision making. Also discussed were high school rivalries, omelettes, and AP courses. Joyce visited to discuss the Genesee Valley trip with the group, and to mention the WV service trip.

## MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

First, I would like to say how excited I am to be serving as the board president at TUUC! We have a great leadership team and I am indebted to each of the other board members, but especially the officers (Angela Castillo-Epps, Sue Royer, and Monica Sweidel). The board had its first meeting of the year in September, and voted to fund a new roof with funds borrowed from the endowment. The board also officially welcomed our new ministerial intern, Lora Powell-Haney.

The governance task force will continue its work in helping guide the development process as we pass through this trial year. I am optimistic that the new structure in its final form, with everyone's help, will help TUUC better realize its mission and vision.

## CW: Murder and Suicide

Our spiritual question this month is, “What does it mean to be a people of sanctuary?” When I first heard the question, I was reminded of a conversation, many years ago, with founding member, Jay Cherry. I referenced the room in which we worship as “the sanctuary.” Jay gently corrected me. He said, “It’s the Meeting Room. It’s called ‘The Meeting Room.’” Since I had attended a Quaker school, I understood a worship space being referenced as a place of meeting. I have called it “The Meeting Room” ever since.

Now, I wonder why the word “sanctuary” was uncomfortable for those who named our worship space “The Meeting Room.” Was it because the word sanctuary comes from the Latin *sanctus*, meaning “holy?” Did founders, who claimed the theological identity of Humanism, decide to embrace a word to describe the act of gathering---of meeting? Or were they differentiating the worship space of TUUC from the more formal sanctuary of First Unitarian Universalist Church of Baltimore? I didn’t think to ask Jay these questions many years ago.

More recently, “sanctuary” has taken on the connotation of protection. Unitarian Universalist congregations are voting to become sanctuary congregations to offer a safe space to immigrant families at risk of deportation.

A sanctuary is a place of meeting for protection, safety, shelter, refuge. Our Soul Matters theme-based ministry packet contains this Irish proverb: “It is in the shelter of each other that the people live.”

I have been thinking about this proverb ever since learning of the violent deaths of former TUUC member, Kay Terry, and her husband, Cliff, on September 21<sup>st</sup>. Just before 2 p.m., after 48 years of marriage, Cliff inexplicably pushed Kay in a wheelchair out to their car in a parking lot at the Charlestown retirement community. He shot and killed Kay as she sat in the wheelchair. He then turned the gun on himself and died.

These tragic deaths do not reflect what we remember of Cliff and Kay. Cliff attended Christmas Eve services at TUUC and put out his hand to offer good wishes for the holidays.

Kay was soft-spoken and inquisitive. She served as Secretary of the TUUC Board from 2008-2010. Prior to that, she had served as President of the League of Women Voters of Baltimore County. With her keen interest in the democratic process, she wondered why the TUUC Board Secretary did not have a vote as a member of the Board. As a result, today, the TUUC Board Secretary has a vote!

Before moving to Charlestown, Kay participated in the TUUC Women’s Luncheon at Edenwald. She always took an active interest in moral issues.

Kay took time to write notes and e-mails of gratitude. An email saved in my files from March of 2016 reads:

*Hi Clare—I thought your letter in the Sun today on the Texas abortion law was excellent. And, perfectly timed.*

*Kay (and Cliff too)*

In spite of the horrific and tragic way their lives ended, this is how I choose to remember Kay and Cliff Terry.

Part of what it means to be a people of sanctuary is to offer refuge and healing when the world is cruel and makes no sense. Another part of what it means to be a people of sanctuary is to offer protection

and strength, to go back out into the world to make it a better place.

Whether we think of ourselves as gathering in the TUUC Meeting Room or gathering in the sanctuary, let us do both. We need one another. The world needs us. "It is in the shelter of each other that the people live."

*Sanctuary, Not Just Shelter*


